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About Range

Range is a mobile app that displays the nearest place in time and location for a school age youth to get a free summer meal. Range is available for Windows, Android and iOS mobile phones via http://www.RangeApp.org

Range is built to make it exceptionally easy for trusted community messengers – people like librarians and clergy – to share information about summer lunch programs.

Food insecurity increases for youth during the summer. Only 1 in 6 kids who access the federal-funded lunch programs access summer meals. As school lets out for the summer, youth lose the easy place to go to get a meal – the school cafeteria. But free summer meals are everywhere – in community parks, at pools, in apartment complexes, at libraries and, yes, sometimes even at schools that are otherwise closed for the summer months.

We built Range because we believe that helping with youth hunger is everyone's job. If we can make it easy for people to share the news about resources that exist, more kids will eat during the summer.

Range was built by Caravan Studios. We have also built SafeNight to help provide urgently needed shelter in the areas of domestic violence and human trafficking and have recently launch 4Bells, a mobile service that helps mobilize volunteers after a disaster.
